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Executive Summary

People's campus is a community based and non for profit organization. The campus has been committed to providing quality education since 1981 AD and continuously evolved to cater to the changing dimension of education. The annual report is prepared in the format prescribed by the University Grant Commission (UGC) and to disseminate overall activities, achievements, issues and challenges of the campus. Through the annual report, the organization expects to maintain openness and transparency of their activities and the governance of the organization. The annual report covers the period of 2079 Shrawan 1 to 2080 Ashad end.

The report covers statistical data relating to total number of student enrolment and pass rate, academic courses conducted or proposed by the campus, physical infrastructure, financial progress, social progress, issues & Challenges encountered by the campus and plans & programs. Statistical data further elaborated to various marginalized students groups wise, fiscal year wise and level wise analysis of data.

1. Introduction

1.1 Background

People's Campus, a pioneering and a leading community-based non-profit academic institution, was established in 1981 A.D. with the initiation of a group of visionary educationists, professionals and key stakeholders in the field of education with the motto of enhancing quality education, which is affordable to the wider society. Centrally located at Paknajol, Kathmandu the campus spreads well over the area of 2035 square meters of land. This spacious land at the heart of the city makes the campus self-reliant regarding the need for infrastructure rendering education to 1000 plus students. The main block of the campus along with its annex building houses more than sixty fully furnished classrooms, state-of-the-art computer labs, e-library, well-resourced library, auditorium, and a wide ground for outdoor games, parking and other purposes. Its peaceful atmosphere is conducive for an effective teaching and learning environment.

Along with the changing pace and demand of time, the campus has been modifying and modernizing the teaching pedagogy and organizing various types of demand-driven training for the teachers. In order to strengthen the learner autonomy in the classroom and to motivate learners intrinsically, the campus organizes activities viz. workshops, presentations, seminars and well-modified lectures. Thus, People's Campus combines academic excellence with an innovative and entrepreneurial approach to support a culture that engages and challenges students and staff in their pursuit of learning.



2.1 Enrolment

Enrolment of students in different programs gradually decreased over the period of three years. In the fiscal year 2077-78, total number of student enrolment was 390. In FY 2078-79, number of student enrolment reached to total 280 with decrement in number. However the enrollment number in FY 2079-80 is 249. Program-wise Student Enrolment


2.1.1 Enrolment in MBS program



2.4 Educational Pedagogy

People's Campus is committed toward quality education that is affordable to wider society which is also reflected in our motto. The campus has been deploying evolved techniques of teaching to cater to the changing dimension of education. The campus offers a continuous learning environment to our faculty members and provides a wide range of opportunities to students to thrive to excellence. It is involved in various research and studies to deliver quality education to students and a good working environment to our faculty members and other employees. It also is used multimedia in the classes to give clear understanding and to allow out of the box thinking on the subject matter.

Each year The campus prepares course plans through a holistic approach and ensures the completion of each course within the specified timeline. For this It has been using the teacher's log sheet which allows us to monitor and track the teaching activities within a class.

In addition to class lectures, we also adopt other methods of teaching like demonstration methods, question and answer methods and use of computerized tools to give a clear concept of topic. We also conduct special classes with multimedia sessions to provide practical knowledge about the topics.

In addition, the campus has been following strategies to enhance the teaching and learning environment;

- Closely monitor the progress of classes and evaluate the time allowed by the teacher for a specific topic.
- 2. Conduct guest lectures and motivational class from the expert of subject matter as per need.
- 3. Extra class conducted for the students who need special attention.

- 4. Use of group discussion and presentation methods to empower students with presentation skills.
- 5. Teacher evaluation based on the feedback from the students regarding teaching methodologies applied in the class and its effectiveness.

3. Physical Progress

3.1 Physical Infrastructure

The campus has the following physical infrastructure that is used for academic and non academic purposes. 3.2 Educational Aids

The campus has the following educational aids within the campus premises to promote a learning environment.

3.2.1 Building and Classes

The campus has two buildings in Pakanjor, Kathmandu comprising 60 plus fully furnished class rooms. The campus also owns lands in Sanobharyang covering four ropanies of area and in Panchkhal covering sixty ropanies of area which was given by the community with condition to establish the educational institution only.

The Campus has Fifteen classrooms fully equipped with multimedia facilities to be used for regular classes as per the need of subject matter.

3.2.2 Library

The campus has a library in Annex - 1 building with around 25K of books, journals and reference materials. Within the library an open study space for students allows students to study the library material and meetup for discussion. Library open study space can cater to a maximum of 30 students at a time. The campus has also provided daily newspapers, weekly and monthly magazines in the library to allow students to have current news and information.

Collections of books, journals and reference materials available in the library are sufficient to cover study areas and other contemporary streams for the students..

Library Enhancement

People's Campus has enhanced the library facility using PMB web based integrated Library Management System. Currently all library activities have been managed from the library management system.

3.2.3 Computer Labs

The campus has 3 computer labs each fully equipped with the computers, projects and with internet access having a seating capacity of more than 30+ students.

3.2.4 E-Library

Under the grant of the University Grant Commission, the campus has started an e-library in 2017 with nine computers with internet access to enable students to explore the internet archives and online libraries.

3.2.5 Security equipment

The campus has installed sufficient security equipment to monitor suspicious activities within the campus premises. In total seventeen CCTV cameras have been installed and monitored by the central monitoring screen installed at Campus

Chief's room. These security equipment to ensure the safety and surveillance of possible unauthorized activities within the campus premises.

3.2.6 Auditorium

The campus has a fully furnished auditorium with a seating capacity of more than hundred people which was constructed with the grant assistance of the University Grant Commission. Major functions of college and learning activities are conducted in this auditorium

3.2.7 Power Equipment

For uninterrupted operation of teaching and administrative activities of the college, the college has installed a power backup system and one generator of 10 KW and Solar system.

3.2.8 Sports facility and playground

In order to promote sport during leisure time during the campus hours, sufficient sports equipment has been provided. Within the campus premises, there is one playground for sports activities.

3.2.9 Cafeteria Facility

The campus has its own cafeteria facility for the students as well as for faculty members and employees. Cafeteria offers fresh and hygienic food at an affordable price, the campus conducts regular supervision and monitoring of cafeteria facilities in order to ensure the quality and price offered to students.

3.2.10 Toilet Facilities enhancement

In FY 2079-80, Office toilets were renovated with improved sanitary facilities.

3.2.11 Student Alumni

The People's Alumni Association was formed and a separate website has been created and integrated in the website of People's Campus.
